Pastor's Pen

It was a hot Sunday morning on July 1st, 2018 and I awoke in Marion, Ken-

tucky. The day before had marked a couple big mile stones for me. First, I had finished being on the road for a full month, and second, I was now across the Ohio River and officially on what I felt was "the east coast." I recorded in my journal the following reflection.

Day 31 - "What a blessed Sabbath. I did ride my bike today, but only 65 miles to get from one church to another. My dad and I awoke in the youth room of Marion UMC. After our McDonald's breakfast we went back to the church for their 8:30 worship service. It was a cute service being just us, Pastor David and one church member. Pastor David led

the entire service. He played the guitar, preached and offered us communion. It was a little strange to just be us four and I ended up running the media. Only when we started singing did my heart come alive and tears filled my eyes. I was overwhelmed by how much I had been singing alone to the Lord (on my bike) and how precious it was to sing now with others."

I believe when we finally get together and sing as a congregation, tears will again fill my eyes because I have been missing corporate worship so much. "Sheltering in place" is getting old. I am ready to be back to some semblance of normalcy and even more ready to enjoy being together with my church family.

What a day of celebration that will be!

Leadership is planning on a Homecoming like celebration with perhaps a catered meal when we get back together. However, when I picture this I also realize we will not be returning in the way we departed. Unless a vaccine is miraculously created in the next weeks, we will gather with the possibility of Covid-19 returning to our community. This means when we return it will necessitate social guidelines to be in place to protect one another. We will follow the recommendation of our local health professionals, but begin to think with me about how this might look. (continue page 3)

work? Sometimes science or professionals are God's instruments to answer my questions. Sometimes answers come quietly to my heart — and sometimes they don't come at all.

Faith doesn't mean never questioning. It means trusting enough to ask, even when a question seems silly or pointless. Thanks, Mom and Dad, for teaching me by your loving example that God always welcomes my questions.

CHUCK BURKLEO, A GOOD SCOUT



I got to know him originally through South Fork School and the Cub Scout Troop here at Trinity. As a matter of fact, if it wasn't for the three musketeers of Chuck Burkleo, Roy Harding, Sr. and Don Wilson, we might never have come to Trinity and it has been a blessing to be at Trinity for these many years. So I'm a father of "one of Chuck's boys", that's what he called them, "his boys", and in the last several months he was just as happy to see those boys grown up as he was to work with them weekly during their scouting years. He was proud and always got emotional when he talked about "his boys". He talked about my Brian less than two weeks before he passed.

At Trinity, his favorite duty was being an usher. I'm sure you can imagine why he liked being an usher...I'll tell you a little secret...Chuck wasn't an usher...he was a greeter who handed out bulletins, and he only did that after he got a hug. Hands down, Chuck was Trinity's number one hugger. And...he was an equal opportunity hugger...he'd hug a 93 year old woman as she came in and then he'd bend over to hug a six year old girl that came in...and he'd hug everyone in between. He'd almost knock you down to get to someone he hadn't hugged. It was that important to him. He always signed up to be usher and when someone was absent...guess who volunteered to be substitute usher? Chuck and I ushered together scores of times over the years and he made clear his seniority. But you also get to know someone better when you're in a job like that together. Several months ago, as he was recovering from one of his illnesses, I took him off the list of ushers, thinking of course, that he would need time to recover properly. Oh he gave Van, our head usher such a time. I had to step in to keep Van from taking all the heat. So I admitted to Chuck that I took him off the list. And I told him why. He looked me straight in the eye, with tears starting to well up, and he said shaking a finger at me, "you're the last person I ever thought would do that to me". I was petrified and I got emotional about it. But I also realized just how important it was to him. He continued to usher until his final illness just got too much for him. He loved the engagement with other people.

Construction was his line of work and there are things around the church that Chuck worked on even still. He was a volunteer fireman back in his New York days and he used that experience down here when there was a crisis. He and Vivienne travelled all over the country and to other parts of the world...but he also enjoyed the simplicity of bird watching and working with his son, David.

He was very proud of both Vicki and David and I know that because of the many times he complimented them in front of me.

And as far as Vivienne is concerned, it couldn't have always been a bed of roses during their 64 years together, after all, Chuck was Chuck, but she handled every moment with grace and charm and raised a family that includes 4 grandsons and 2 great-grandsons.

Chuck was a character and he was a big part of what makes up the Trinity family. We're all characters in one way or another. But in addition to being a character, Chuck was love....all love comes through God and flows through us—it originates from the father and that is where it should ultimately rest. But remember, Jesus is the stranger, the sick, the child, the neighbor, the prisoner, you, me, and it was Chuck whose boundless love and energy leapt out of him at every turn.

Chuck was very supportive of my going into the ministry and he always told me how proud he was. The last time he got serious with me and wagged his finger at me was to say..."when I go, I want you there to talk about me...promise me". And then he said "talk loud". Well I hope you've heard me old friend...I'll see you at the house!!

The Shepherd Center has postponed their annual Book Sale until August 27-29th.


The Prayer Garden "Little Library" is offering books to read and puzzles for all ages. They will be changed out every 2 weeks. Check us out!
